# The Impact of District Local Technical Assistance (DLTA)

Little by little, a little becomes a lot.

A zoning bylaw. A mapping project. A gateway mockup. Support to an Economic Development Corporation. These projects may seem minor, but great places are built brick by brick. Such is the legacy of District Local Technical Assistance (DLTA) in Central Massachusetts.

Since 2006, the Massachusetts General Assembly (Legislature) has provided RPAs with DLTA funding. This resource allows CMRPC and its sister agencies to provide direct technical assistance to member communities. For 18 years, CMRPC has used DLTA funds to undertake small but catalytic community-driven projects that lack other funding sources. In 2023, CMRPC undertook more than 20 such projects, most on behalf of multiple communities. These bite-sized projects have a compound impact.

DLTA has been used to organize farmers. Launch nonprofits. Pilot cutting-edge zoning. Engage youth. Meet grant match requirements. Kickstart planning processes. Design downtowns. Guide committees. Reach inter-municipal agreements. The list goes on and on, and the impact is cumulative: development projects build upon, add to, and amplify each other. As Vincent van Gogh once said, "Little by little, a little becomes a lot."

# Youth Trail Stewardship Program in Partnership with MassAudubon



CMRPC has just wrapped up its final report on its youth trail stewardship project. In Spring 2023, CMRPC staff received **District Local Technical** Assistance (DLTA) funding to establish a youth trail stewardship group as part of the MassTrails-funded **CMRPC Trail Accessibility &** Inclusion Toolkit. The Toolkit, which is being finalized this month. allows landowners to assess trails for accessibility and inclusion standards that go beyond the standards laid out in ADA regulations. The toolkit uses a rubric focusing on accessibility and inclusion attributes for underserved populations (youth, elderly, BIPOC, low-income residents, etc.), looking at what kinds of trail features promote

comfortability on trails, promote knowledge that trails exist to these populations, and promote accessibility based on location/transportation, among other attributes.

CMRPC staff sought to ensure they could incorporate youth voices into the development of the report, understanding that youth are an underserved population with regards to trail accessibility for several reasons, including limited options for transportation, a lack of financial resources, and a lack of awareness about safely accessible trails in their community. They decided to establish a youth group to provide input on the report and inform the auditing process. The project would also provide an opportunity to educate the youth about trails and accessibility.

After acquiring funding, CMRPC conducted a round of outreach to youth education organizations in the region to see if there was any interest in helping to form a group. <u>MassAudubon</u> staff at the <u>Broad Meadow Brook Wildlife</u> <u>Sanctuary</u> in Worcester agreed to schedule some time with a group of around ten teenagers from a program they were conducting in partnership with the Regional Environmental Council urban agriculture nonprofit.

Throughout July and into early August, CMRPC met with the youth group to introduce trail accessibility and inclusion concepts and practices and discuss the unique challenges facing youth. Input from these discussions was used to develop new attributes for the Toolkit's trail grading rubric, with assigned point

values also weighed in on by the youth group. The MassAudubon supervisors also took the group on a hike of an accessible trail at Broadmeadow Brook to give the group a firsthand understanding of trail accessibility features. For the last meeting, the group was allowed to use the full CMRPC rubric to audit a less accessible trail in Worcester. # Exploring Opportunities for Urban Agriculture and Food Forests in Worcester

CMRPC recently completed a **District Local Technical** Assistance (DLTA) project to begin research and an initial assessment of tax-title properties in the city of Worcester for their potential to be used for urban agriculture, particularly food forests. The choice to focus on food forests came about through discussions with representatives from the **Regional Environmental** Council (REC) an urban agriculture non-profit in Worcester, Urban food forests are permaculture gardens that consist of various edible perennial plants and fruit trees, mimicking the basic structure and ecosystem functions of natural forests to increase crop yield and resiliency. Urban food forests are also relatively less expensive to create. Over time, they become increasingly self-



sufficient and will require fewer resources to sustain.

The initial assessment of foreclosed properties took the form of an audit, wherein properties were screened for food forest suitability based on environmental conditions, socioeconomic factors, and parcel characteristics. The resulting preliminary report draft also includes strategies and recommendations for food forest production in Worcester. Part of the analysis included generating maps that depicted the potential suitability of the properties, considering different conditions and factors.

The team also acquired <u>Executive Office of Energy & Environmental Affairs</u> (<u>EEA</u>) grant funding to continue the development of the analysis into a full report, which should be completed later this year. For more information, contact Sam Carter at scarter@cmrpc.org

### Digital Equity Initiatives for Central Massachusetts



The Town of Charlton, in partnership with CMRPC staff, has recently completed its Digital Equity Charette. Beginning in the summer of 2023, CMRPC began collaborating with the Town of Charlton on its Digital Equity Charette. The Charette was made possible in collaboration with the **Massachusetts Broadband** Institute (MBI). MBI's goal is to ensure digital equity for all Massachusetts residents. Digital Equity is the condition in which all individuals and communities have the technological capacity needed for full participation in our society, democracy, and economy.

Utilizing community engagement, community meetings, data collection, and an analysis of current conditions,

CMRPC partnered in the creation of the <u>Digital Equity Report</u> for the Town of Charlton. The report will aid in securing future funding to implement the recommendations and goals set in the final plan document.

Additionally, CMRPC is currently working with the City of Worcester on its Digital Equity Charette and is currently in its community engagement phase.

# 2025 - 2029 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Development

The **Transportation** Improvement Program (TIP) is a federally mandated requirement applicable to all Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs). It serves as a prioritized inventory of federal-aid transportation investments within an MPO's planning area



for the upcoming five federal fiscal years.

The TIP development process for the 2025 – 2029 CMMPO TIP is now underway. Communities with potential candidate projects in Rutland, West Brookfield, Westborough, and Worcester have been invited to the January CMMPO meeting to present their project to the board members. During the TIP development, staff will evaluate new projects using the Performance Management criteria. These criteria aim to assess the anticipated outcomes of TIP investments in the transportation network, aligning with the goals outlined in the US DOT's Transportation Planning Factors. These goals include reducing congestion, improving pavement conditions, and enhancing safety. Additionally, projects that promote public transit, bicycling, and walking are actively sought for inclusion in the Central Massachusetts TIP.

Throughout the TIP development, the CMMPO ensures an extensive outreach effort, adhering to the established Public Participation Program (PPP). This program offers numerous opportunities for stakeholders and public involvement. The current **TIP development schedule** is available on the CMRPC website, featuring upcoming CMMPO and CMMPO Advisory Committee meeting dates, as well as any other public meetings related to the TIP.

The TIP is anticipated to be endorsed by the CMMPO in May 2024. Subsequently, it will be forwarded to the MassDOT Office of Transportation **Planning (OTP)**, where it will be combined with the TIP listings from each of the state's 13 planning regions. The resulting document, the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP), will then undergo review and approval by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This process aims to ensure that the new TIP can become effective on October 1, 2024.

# **CMRPC Secures \$600,000 Safe Streets Grant for Vital Community Initiatives**

CMRPC's transportation team has successfully secured \$600,000 in state and federal funding for their Central Mass Safe Streets for All Action Plan and Worcester Main South Demonstration Project through the Safe Streets and Roads for All grant program.

These funds are earmarked for the development of an Action Plan and the execution of crucial planning and demonstration activities. In the coming weeks, representatives from the <u>Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)</u> will be in contact with CMRPC to initiate and finalize the SS4A grant agreement.

# Successful 2023 Traffic Counting Season

This data serves as a foundation for making informed decisions regarding transportation planning, infrastructure improvements, and traffic management strategies. The goal is to use this information to enhance the efficiency, safety, and overall functionality of our transportation network.

Thank you to our dedicated transportation staff for their hard work throughout the counting season. As we bid farewell to this year's traffic counting season, we eagerly anticipate the warmer months when the season will start up again.

### **CDBG Assistance Program Accomplishments in 2023**

Construction work on public facilities and infrastructure projects funded through the Commonwealth's Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program has wrapped up for the winter season after making significant headway in 2023.

CMRPC's Community Development team spent the last several months overseeing CDBG-funded infrastructure and facilities projects in the towns of Brookfield, Dudley, Leicester, Millbury, North Brookfield, and Warren that were identified through local community engagement and planning processes which prioritize improvements in targeted, underserved residential areas.

Project assistance has ranged from oversight of the engineering/architectural design process to assistance with bidding to review of prevailing wage submittals. For more information on CMRPC's CDBG assistance program, please contact Andrew Loew at aloew@cmrpc.org

#### Brookfield Green Street Improvements Project

This project includes the installation of a new 8-inch water main to replace the existing undersized and deteriorated line, along with a new 12-inch drain line and asphalt berms to channel stormwater runoff into catch basins. Final improvements to the road surface including reclamation and paving will occur in 2024.





#### **Dudley First Avenue**

This project involves the design and construction of a new water main, sewer repairs, improvements to and extension of sidewalks, and patching of roadway surfaces on First Avenue. This work was completed in 2023. A second grant will fund the full pavement of the roadway in 2024.

#### Leicester Housing Authority

This project involves design engineering and construction services for the rehabilitation of road and sidewalk surfaces, drainage improvements, fence installation, wall repair, and general site work at the Leicester Housing Authority





#### North Brookfield Senior Center

#### Millbury Pearl Street Project

This project involves the construction of improved water, sewer, drainage, sidewalk, and limited roadway surfaces on Pearl Street, adjacent to the Millbury Housing Authority's Linden Apartments. This work was substantially completed in 2023. Final paving will take place in 2024, to be funded by other locally controlled grant funds.



This project involves rehabilitation of the roof at the North Brookfield Senior Center to address deteriorating conditions.

Warren School Street Project

This project includes installing a new water main and associated improvements to the retaining wall and fence that supports parts of the roadway and sidewalk along School Street.

### **Environmental & Resiliency Planning**

### Upcoming Workshops Addressing Air Pollution in our Region

CMRPC's Environmental and Resiliency team at CMRPC is the lead partner in the creation of the Priority Climate Action Plan for the Greater Worcester Region as part of the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant. CMRPC received a \$1 Million planning grant from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to develop a set of climate action plans for the Greater Worcester Region, spanning communities in northern Worcester County down to communities in Northeast Connecticut.



The first plan, the Priority Climate Action

Plan (PCAP), will focus on developing short-term, implementable projects that can reduce greenhouse gas emissions in six key sectors: Transportation, Electricity, Commercial and Residential Buildings, Industry, Waste, and Natural/Working Lands. The PCAP is currently in development and will be anticipated to be complete by March 2024.

For planning purposes, CMRPC is leading the outreach and working closely with the Montachusett Regional Planning Commission for outreach in their region and the Northeast Connecticut Council of Governments for outreach in our Northeast Connecticut towns.

To date, CMRPC has held three public engagement workshops, in West Brookfield, Shrewsbury, and Webster. The workshops were open to the public and were a great place to engage with residents and public officials to discuss goals, projects, and other ideas to reduce emissions and create cleaner air. The Gaming Mitigation Fund (due Feb. 1, 2024): The Gaming Mitigation Fund provides grants to Massachusetts nonprofit and municipal performing arts centers to spend on touring shows or touring artist fees. Applicants must satisfy the following criteria: be a performing arts center; be a nonprofit organization or owned by a municipality; and present touring shows or artists. Housing Choice Designation (due Feb. 2024): Rewards municipalities for housing production and adoption of housing best practices. Designated communities get exclusive access to a Housing Choice Capital Grant program under the Community One Stop for Growth and preferential treatment for other state grant and capital funding programs. 604(b) Grant Program: Water Quality Management Planning Grant (anticipated Dec. 2023 – Feb. 2024): This competitive grant program funds watershed or subwatershed-based nonpoint source assessment and planning projects. <u>Community Compact Efficiency and Regionalization Grant Program</u> (due Feb. 9, 2024): The Efficiency and Regionalization (E&R) competitive grant program provides financial support for implementing regionalization and other efficiency initiatives that allow for long-term sustainability. <u>MicroProjects</u> (due Feb. 21, 2024): The MicroProjects Program is the Central Massachusetts Metropolitan Planning Organization funding program for first and lastmile solutions, workforce transportation, and other capital purchases like bicycle racks, bicycle storage, and bike sharing capital expenses (not operations), and wayfinding for bicyclists and pedestrians. <u>Community Development Fund</u> (CDF) (due Mar. 4, 2024): CDF is the state's Community Development Block Grant program for non-entitlement communities. These competitive grants for mostly smaller cities and towns can be used to benefit low- and moderate-income residents or to mitigate blighted physical conditions through infrastructure and facility improvements, planning, and other projects. Recipient communities typically have large populations of low and moderate-income residents. <u>Community Compact Municipal Fiber Grant Program</u> (due Apr. 12, 2024) Helps municipalities improve their municipal fiber networks to connect municipal facilities, enhance cybersecurity, handle complex IT infrastructure, enable remote collaboration for employees, provide adequate internet bandwidth, and centralize IT management. #### **Outdoor Recreation Legacy Partnership Program (ORLPP) Grant**
